As I write, it's Monday morning, the day after Easter. It's been a long, yet meaningful Lenten journey filled with focused devotions, new found acts of service, community gatherings for worship and fellowship. Holy Week has been especially emotional moving from the shouts of "Hosanna" to shouts of "Crucify him", from the expectation of deliverance to the stench of death on the cross. And then there is the darkness from Friday afternoon as all hope seems to have been abandoned and the world is covered with a sense of defeat. It was all so long ago and far away, yet so real as we linger beneath the cross. While spending time there is painful, it is important to return to that grounding that convicts us of the consequence of our sin. That ugliness was of our making, and let to our own devices, that is where humanity would still be.

But we celebrate the good news that God does not leave us where our choices have led. God allows the suffering of the cross, the humiliation of himself, the grip of death, the descent into Hell. He allows it knowing the limits of power and the limitlessness of his. God knows the authority of his Word in the ear of life and death. And when he says, "Rise" there is nothing that can hold his own down or back. Resurrection is the key to freedom from this world and for this world.

To limit Easter to one day is to sell God short. The fact of the matter is that every Sunday, or as we refer to it "Lord's Day", is like a little Easter. That is why we refer to them as the Sundays in Lent, not the Sundays of Lent. The power of resurrection not only fills the day, it becomes the way of life for all days to come. As Christ is raised, so have we been and that makes all the difference in the world.

In Colossians 3, Paul instructs us about the practical implications of resurrection. "So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above...set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth." Using the image of baptism (which was central to worship on Easter Day) he reminds us that being found in Christ we have died to our old selves and been raised to new life, just as one being baptized goes under the water (as going into the grave) and is lifted out of the water into new life. In the early church, one being baptized would remove their old clothing before entering the waters, a mark of leaving their old way of life behind. After being baptized they would leave the waters being draped in a new white robe, a symbol of their new life in Christ.

Recalling that imagery, Paul's words are quite clear and vivid: As those who die to self, we put to death those earthly things in us: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire and greed. We get rid of such things as anger, wrath, malice, slander and abusive language. In our baptism, we "strip off the old self with its practices."

Being raised with Christ we are clothed with a new self, (a new set of spiritual attire). "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience..." (Col. 3:12). Such behavior befits those who have been set free to exhibit the ways of heaven on earth...to be a "foretaste of glory divine."

Scripture tells us that we will be known by the fruit we bear. Anyone can talk the talk of resurrection, the question is will we walk the talk? Has Christ's rising from the dead set you free from the grip of sin and death? Being found in the risen Lord has your way of life been changed? Is Easter Day a day like any other, or is it a defining moment as to who you have become and are becoming?

Paul writes, "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation. The old has passed away—behold the new has come." As one recreated in the risen Lord may your witness be received with a resounding "Alleluia" now and forever.....

## Confirmation Classes

## Dining with Diabetes

Dining with Diabetes is a program for adults with diabetes and their families. Classes are offered weekly for four weeks with a three-month follow-up class. Preregistration is required due to space limitations. Participants will learn how to prepare meals that are healthy, simple, and taste good. Recipes will be demonstrated and participants will have the opportunity to taste each one. Participants will also learn up-to-date information on nutrition, meal planning, and exercise as well as how to understand common, diabetes-related medical tests. Recipes and handouts will be given to each participant. Diabetes is a very serious and costly disease, but research has shown that those who learn to manage their blood glucose (sugar) levels, eat healthy, and exercise regularly can lower their risk of complications and lead a healthier and more productive life. Classes will be held in the Fellowship Hall beginning Monday, April 18<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 AM until 12:30 PM that also meets April 25<sup>th</sup>, May 2<sup>nd</sup>, May 9<sup>th</sup> and July 25<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM. \*We will have our lunch outside under the large tree.


