How is it that we are best governed? In the old, old days, governance was by a theocracy, that is a form of rule in which God is recognized as the supreme civil ruler and laws are interpreted by God's priests. It makes perfect sense to be ruled by the Lord God, who is sovereign and just and true. All is well, as long as those who administer the day to day details are faithful and true to God. For many years, God's people found security and joy in being ruled by God—but in the latter days of Samuel, things changed. "Then all the elders of Israel gathered together and came to Samuel at Ramah and said to him, 'You are old and your sons do not follow your ways; appoint for us, then, a king to govern us, like other nations.' This thing displeased Samuel. He prayed to the Lord and the Lord said to Samuel, 'Listen to the voice of the people in all that they say to you; for they have not rejected you, but they have rejected me from being king over them.'" (I Samuel 8)

You've heard the expression, "be careful what you pray for, you might get it." From that day on, for God's people it has a long line of kings, Saul, David, Solomon..... Some good godly men and some self serving, some giving themselves to the promotion of God's kingdom and some building only for themselves. Throughout the Bible we see that God uses those in position of power. Sometimes he ordains an evil ruler as a punishment to the people for their sin. Sometimes God uses a ruler who does not know him to be a blessing to his people. Sometimes God says, "You think you know what is best for you—then go ahead and see how far you get without me." And sometimes God redeems his wayward people with the gift of godly leaders. But whatever the circumstance, I believe God is in control, and in his ultimate plan there is good for us.

As a student of history, I have always been interested in the faith practices of those who lead. C.S. Lewis wrote, "If you read history you will find that Christians who did the most for the present world were just those who thought most of the next." The question is not, who are we?, It's "Who are we becoming?" Its not a matter of where we want to be ten years from now, it's a vision of where God would have us be three generations from now. The core question of successful leadership is not, "How will I be remembered in the annals of history?", but rather, "How will what I do serve to promote and exhibit God's kingdom?" True leadership begins in service of other's, in the model of Jesus who Paul describes as "he who emptied himself, taking the form of a slave...who humbled himself and became obedient..." (Philippians 2).

As we cast our ballots in a few weeks, we are searching for one who will address our needs and meet our expectations. We want a leader who will make us the best nation we can be. But I assure you whoever our next president will be, he or she will only be as effective as we are in our citizenship. The greatness of a nation is defined by the readiness of each of its people to do that which is right and good in the neighborhood in which they live. The character of a nation is defined by the values, the ethics, its people uphold.

May your ballot be cast in prayer with a deep desire that as a partial result of it, God's kingdom would be known in some fuller way. "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone; for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceful life in all godliness and dignity." (I Timothy 2:1)......

Moment for Mission

Oregon Congregation Connects with Children from the Community What do you do when your Sunday school consists of one threeyear-old child? If you're First Presbyterian Church of Myrtle Point, Oregon, you invite other kids from the community to join her. That's exactly what the congregation, which is 27 members strong, did. In an effort to surround their young one with more children her age, the church body decided to reach out into its neighborhood. It invited to Sunday school, among others, the children of parents who used to attend the church as little ones. The first attempt was centered on the Advent season, and when the Sunday school grew to eight, the church decided to run another class during Lent. It was so successful that First Presbyterian decided to offer vacation Bible school this summer for the first time in 15 years. "We have felt the enthusiasm and the energy it has given our congregation," said Sandy Gurney, a ruling elder who has helped lead the Sunday school. "It's not us who is doing this. It's God who's helping this, and the kids really feel that." Just as importantly, it has made an impact on that little three-year-old's life. "When she wound up at her mother's place on Christmas Day," recalled pastor Agnes Brady, "she insisted on telling the Christmas story because it wasn't Christmas without telling the Christmas story. We were just delighted that we were making that kind of impact in a family where the Christmas story would not be considered to be part of the Christmas celebration. It was very much a direct relationship to the Sunday school." There was talk of following the lead of many churches by making the class a nine-month program, but Brady suggested first giving it a try during Advent and then picking it up again over Lent. This keeps the commitment level down for the small congregation and also allows for the class to remain unique. "It keeps it special enough for the kids that we get them," Brady said. "We don't have the people to run it yearround-we'd be pulling people out of worship all the time-but we have people who are willing to step out of worship for a month for the kids." The Sunday school now includes three preschoolers and five elementary school-aged children. It begins in the sanctuary before the worship service and includes Brady and the "Church Mouse"—a quiet and shy puppet that whispers in Brady's ear to help instruct the class. "Some of the kids had never been in the church at all," Gurney said, explaining why they start in the sanctuary. "We just try to use that time to explain a little bit about what we're doing and then a little bit about the church service itself." The Sunday school finishes up in a classroom, running for roughly 90 total minutes and involving everything from Bible songs to crafts. It all seems to be having a lasting effect on the children. "The second week of Advent, one little boy asked his mom, 'What's the name of that fun place we go to on Sundays?'" Gurney said. "And she said, 'You mean church?' "We're known as a fun and safe place. They're very comfortable now with coming to church." Mike Givler, Communications Coordinator for the Synod of the Trinity
