It was a dark and stormy night, and little Janey laid wide eyed in her bed. As a bolt of lightning illumined the sky and the roll of thunder shook her bed, she took off across the hall to her parent's room. "Mama, Papa, can I sleep in here with you two tonight?" Their first inclination was to settle her in between them, but they knew that at some point she would have to face the storm of life alone. As difficult as it was, Mama said, "No Janey, you'll have to go back to your room. You don't have to be afraid because God will be with you." "I know that" she replied, "but on a night like tonight I could really use a God with skin on."

As we read the scriptures of the Old Testament we are given witness after witness to the great Creator God, robed in majesty and mystery. We sing of him—"Immortal, invisible, God only wise, in light inaccessible hid from our eyes, most blessed, most glorious, the Ancient of Days, almighty, victorious, thy great name we praise." Yet as grand as is our heavenly Father, on those dark and stormy nights we need someone more, someone who will walk with us and talk with us, someone who will tell us we are his own.

John sets the scene for his Gospel account, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God....And the Word became flesh and lived among us....full of grace and truth." We call it the incarnation, God putting on flesh, skin, and dwelling with us. In other religious belief systems there are stories of the gods putting on human costumes and mingling with common folk. But what we believe as Christians is something quite different. As God comes to us in Bethlehem, he is not merely wearing a disguise to look like one of us. As God comes to us in Jesus, he comes in all the vulnerability of our humanity. Describing the incarnation, Paul explains it this way; "Christ Jesus, who though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death." (Philippians 2:6-8)

The miracle of Christmas is that God chose, not only to come to us, but to experience this world the way we do. His coming was not a weekend get-away to experience something different. It was not some social experiment to see how we would react. The incarnation, God becoming flesh, was and is a statement of his love for and devotion to us, his people. The Creator was willing to become the creature. The God who owns everything was willing to put it all aside and face this world with nothing, He was willing to step from his throne in the highest heaven into a manger in Bethlehem. He was willing to set aside his Lordship so that he could become a slave. Knowing that we could never fully understand him, he came to experience our dark and stormy nights so that as we endure them together we can begin to know him.

John writes, "He was in the world, and the world came into being through him, yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God."

Last week a newborn baby with umbilical cord still attached, was found wrapped in a towel, laying in the nativity manger at the Holy Child of Jesus Church in Richmond Hill, Queens, N.Y. What do you do with a newborn baby who just appears? Maybe the real question is—what will that newborn baby do with you?

The Word became flesh and dwells among us still.....

2016 Offering Envelopes



Church Kitchen Information

The church has received from the department of agriculture, an Eating and Drinking License to operate in the kitchen. This requires that no wet dish cloths or towels be left in the kitchen to dry. There is a drying rack in the table storage room for this purpose. Also, it is required that the counters and other surfaces be cleaned with a sanitizing solution after every use. The materials to make the sanitizing solution and the directions on how to make it are on the counter in the kitchen. Please remember these guidelines if you or your group are planning to use the kitchen.

Our Cross

Each Sunday as we worship, we enjoy the beauty of the cross that is placed on the communion table. We are grateful to Gary Wyant who keeps that cross polished. We ask that no one moves the cross from the communion table. If for some reason it must be moved, there are white gloves on the piano in the choir room that should be worn. We appreciate your cooperation in keeping our cross free of fingerprints.
