Two young boys were sitting on the bedroom floor watching television while downstairs their parents were hosting the neighborhood New Year's Eve party. One asked, "Just what exactly are new year's resolutions?" The other thought for a moment and replied, "I think it's a 'to do' list for the first week of January." Here we are in the first week of the New Year, but somehow all those things that weighed heavy last year are still with us. Someone said, "My goal for 2017 is to accomplish the goals I set for 2016, which I should have done in 2015 because I made them a priority for 2014, having planned them in detail in 2013." To be sure, there are some who have the discipline to begin the New Year as a new person and remain in that newness forever. But most of us remain in the same shadows and self made prisons of our old ways. I suppose there was a time when I made resolutions, but I've come to realize that if its 11:55 PM on December 31 and I'm chowing down a pepperoni pizza with double cheese chances are I'm not going to lose my desire for it at 12:05 AM on January 1.

We all want to be better people—to be in better health, to move with a more positive attitude, to improve the quality of our relationships with those around us, and most important to be more intentional in our relationship with God. Paul writes, "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation—for the old has passed away, behold the new has come. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation." (II Corinthians 5:17-18)

God's desire for us is intentional. It was known to him and felt by him before the foundation of the world was established. God created us to be in relationship with him, to be open to what he would have us know and do, and to know that by the grace of the Holy Spirit, he is always open for us to come to him. That dialogue between us and God is what we call prayer. Sometimes it is expressed in poetic language, sometimes in raw emotion, sometimes in uncontrollable laughter, sometimes in unleashed tears, sometimes in a scream and sometimes in a wordless sigh. But whatever the form, it comes from the depths of our soul to the breadth of God's heart.

While there is power in the whisper of a sigh, there is great power when the prayers of a community are raised in one voice. God delights when his children join their hearts and together make known their praise and gratitude and desire. For many years as I served congregations in the northern part of the county, my name appeared in the Mission Yearbook of Prayer and Study on the day our Presbytery was highlighted. On that day each year, I could feel the power of the prayers being offered by brothers and sisters around the world for my ministry, and such encouragement lifted me.

A surgeon needs good light to see what needs to be done to assist the patient. But those rays of light focused in the form of a laser have an added strength and intention. Focused prayer is pleasing to God in that it tells him that the hearts of his children are reconciled, one, as they come to him with their desires.

Included in your newsletter is a prayer guide that is used by many Christians around the world. For each day of the week, there are four sets of intentions—foci of prayer concern. Two sets can be a guide for your morning prayers and two for your evening. Some may use one set in the morning, one at noon, one in the evening and one before they retire at night. This guide is a tool to remind us of God's blessings and the needs of the world around us. It is a disciplined way of examining our spiritual walk in the light of Christ.

Billy Graham, as part of his devotional life, reads three Psalms and one chapter of Proverbs daily. That means that in the course of each month he reads the entire Books of Psalms and Proverbs. By following this guide, there can be order and focused purpose in our weekly cycle of prayer—a newfound rhythm in our conversation with God. I'm sure he would be glad to hear from you in a little more detail.....

2017 Per Capita Update

Per Capita, literally "per head", is the amount requested from each member to cover the administrative expenses of the General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery. For 2017, that amount is \$29.58 per member on the active roll. That breaks down to: General Assembly—\$7.50, Synod—\$2.50, and Presbytery—\$19.78. The Session has taken action to withhold all per capita to General Assembly with the exception of contributions given with specific designation to it. Per Capita sent to support Synod and Presbytery is NOT used to support the General Assembly. For this reason, the session sees that those funds are paid unless you request that your share not be. Your box of offering envelopes included a letter explaining your options with regards to your per capita. If you have questions or need a copy of the letter, please contact the church office or see Pastor Monroe. We want to honor your intentions for your gifts to the work of the church.

Family Promise News

Mission Moment—Madison Presbyterian Church In 2014, a year before Madison Presbyterian Church's 200th anniversary, Jill Wiest and I volunteered to see what information we could find to enhance the celebration. After looking through many old files, we wondered if we had found everything—after all, there are many nooks and crannies in our 1846 church building. What about that old safe in the small room off the kitchen that had been the pastor's study in the 1800s? It took a while to find the right key, but eventually we did and we opened it. To our satisfaction, it held a treasure trove of documents, letters, and ledgers that told of some of the highs and lows of Madison Presbyterian Church through the years. The leather-bound ledgers contained records of births, deaths, Sunday collections, and disbursements for supplies, among other official registries, but most interesting were the loose papers, many of which were letters. A large number of them were personal letters written to Clerk of Session and Madison businessman David McClure (1775-1836) and his family. It is not known why these letters ended up in the church safe, but they have given us added insight into our early church history and 19th-century life here. One letter was written in 1824 to McClure's daughter Martha by a schoolmate, Eliza Ann Ristine, of Crawfordsville. Her family had recently moved from Madison to that newly established settlement, and she wrote to her friend that there were only seven families living there. And "at this time, no school is here of any description and not much prospect of one for some time." We felt this letter should be in Crawfordsville, so we donated it to the Montgomery County Historical Society. The next eleven have to do with the church itself: Name (Presbyterian Church of Livonia in Washington County); Original Number of Members (13); Names of Previous Pastors; Date of Founding (1816); Year When the Building was Erected (1820); and Description (log house, 20 by 40 feet, then a brick building, 30 by 55 feet, built in 1826). Question 9 asks if the church was divided in the "recent division of the church" and if so, "How many went to each branch of the church?" Answer: "About 100 went with the Old School, three elders and 25 private members adhered to the Constitutional General Assembly." The final question: "Of how many members is your church now composed?" Answer: "50." One of the members was the famous churchman of the Civil War era Henry Ward Beecher, brother of Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of Uncle Tom's Cabin. We used much of the information found in the safe for our church's 200th anniversary celebration in 2015. What a great time we have had in discovering our church's hidden past!
