To be sure, ours is a society of instant gratification. We expect what we want when we want it. On Demand services allow us to view any movie at any hour of the day or night. While we pump our gas, we can punch in our order for sandwiches so they're ready to be picked up when we pay for our fuel. Tax refunds are available as soon as the paperwork is filed. We have lost sight of the value of waiting—of anticipating that for which we long.

The world wants to jump from Thanksgiving to Christmas, forgetting the Season of Advent. In the same way, there are those who want the joy of Easter Day without moving through the Season of Lent. But reality is that we cannot truly celebrate the risen Lord, if we have not walked with him to Jerusalem, to the cross, and to the grave.

Lent is the forty day period in which we the church, prepare our hearts and minds for the mystery of the resurrection. The number "forty" is significant throughout scripture as a time of testing our faith as we seek to trust God more fully. Noah and his family endured 40 days and 40 nights of rain, the Hebrews endured 40 years of slavery in Egypt, the Israelites wandered 40 years in the wilderness, Moses was on Mt. Sinai for 40 days and nights (twice). Elijah went without food and water for 40 days on Mt. Horeb. Jonah prophesied against Ninevah for 40 days. And Jesus endured 40 days in the wilderness fasting, praying and being tempted by Satan. Such a time of testing can break us or make us unbreakable in our bond with God.

Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday as we are humbled by the reality of our humanity. As the ashes (made by burning the palm branches from the previous year) are imposed, we hear the words— "From dust you were formed, and to dust you will return." Throughout the Bible, we read of those great and small sitting on the ash pile, throwing them overhead as a sign of acknowledging and repenting of their sin. We begin our journey fully aware of our unworthiness before God. And from that point we seek to discover his mercy and grace.

Throughout the 40 day period (which does not include Sundays, because every Sunday is like a little Easter), we take on special acts of sacrifice and service. For some it is fasting from certain activities, or eating certain foods. We "give up" certain things to show that we love God more than we love "them." But just as important as "giving up" certain things is "taking on" certain disciplines. We spend more time reading the Bible, praying, giving of ourselves and our resources to the service of those around us. Some take the money they used to spend on their vices and give it to virtuous pursuits, like helping those in need. Just as Jesus gave of himself for our sake, so too we give of ourselves for the sake of others. Often that temporary discipline of giving becomes a permanent change in the way we live. The closer we walk with God, the more like him we become—because the more of him lives in us. Each day we die to our old sinful nature, and in that dying to the old, we are raised to a new way of living.

In many ways, Lent is personal because we are especially intimate with God. But there is part of the journey we share with each other. The ashes on our foreheads bear witness to others about our contrite and humbled heart. Together we worship as we move closer to the cross. Each day we read the same devotional booklet and focus our prayers. As we consider our One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, we give of ourselves to the same acts of mercy and grace. Each Wednesday at noon, we gather with our brothers and sisters from other congregations for worship and fellowship. By spending time together we discover what it means for the church to be the body of Christ—the body that serves, the body that makes sacrifice, the body that is raised from death to life.

In this Season of Lent, take time to be holy—speak oft with your Lord, abide in him always and feed on his Word. Make friends of God's children, help those who are weak, forgetting in nothing his blessing to seek. Without a Lenten journey, you will never know the true joy of Easter Day. In taking time to be holy, may you be blessed.....

"Human beings need an authentic community where we truly belong: where we can celebrate and where we can cry; where we can be challenged to be our very best and where we can be forgiven when we have been our very worst.

Vaccinations



Mission Moment

Disciple-Making Church Conference offers a spiritual detox of the soul

Rev. Jeff Eddings was here to keynote the Presbyterian Mission Agency's annual Disciple-Making Church Conference. The 2017 conference, titled Abide in Me... A Spiritual Purging, based on John 15:4. Eddings maintains that the spiritual exercises developed by Ignatius—and for which he was famous—are well suited to help today's disciples live fuller mental and spiritual lives in order to bear more fruit for Jesus Christ and Christ's church. Eddings then asked the gathering, "What would it mean to purge ourselves of the toxins in our spiritual life?" such as fear, regret, anxiety, broken relationships, addictions, expectations, and disappointments. "Over the next couple of days we will engage in a spiritual detox of our souls, a purging of all of the stuff that has accumulated in our attics and in our closets," he continued. "How do we make our spiritual purge last? How do we abide in Christ in a lasting manner? Ignatius talks about 'a way of proceeding." That "way" is characterized by Interior Freedom, Disordered Attachments, and Spiritual Indifference, principles that Eddings explained—and illustrated—by way of powerful personal story and example. Eddings's presentation on January 17 explored the impact of Interior Freedom, which is defined as contentment based not on exterior circumstances but on an interior relationship with God. Subsequent keynote presentations addressed Disordered Attachments and Spiritual Indifference. "There is no need to wear yourself out—hear that, pastors, we're not supposed to wear ourselves out," he said, speaking to the call to interior freedom . "Make a competent and sufficient effort, and leave the rest up to God. Interior freedom is not about being important or getting ahead. It's about our relationship with God. Despite your best efforts to be terrible, you can't make God love you any less than God loves you right now. If we can internalize that and believe that, we can find more interior freedom in our lives and in our ministries." Later in small groups, participants were asked to discuss such related questions as "What mental, spiritual, and physical toxins are you dealing with in your life currently?" and "What sense of importance do you need to let go of?" The evening concluded with an original drama, "Stickin with Fishin'," In the drama based on Mark 1:14-19, in which Jesus calls the first disciples, Eddings and Walker explored—both with humor and remarkable vulnerability—what might have happened had fishermen Peter and Andrew held onto their nets. As Eddings' s Peter lay tangled up in his own net on the floor, Walker—describing the disciple's entanglement as a metaphor launched into a personal monologue. "The fist fight I have with myself is my struggle with the net, which is different for each person," Walker said. "We are entangled by our anger, resentment...our entitlements. They lock us in and tangle us up. Then, when we try to find a way out, we're writhing on the floor asking, how do we get out of that?" Citing further passages in Mark where the disciples were silenced for preaching the good news, Walker closed by saying, "We can never stop preaching what we have seen, heard and experienced. We will never stop saying the name of Jesus. Did Peter and Andrew keep their fishing jobs? Not on your life."
