# **UPLIFT** Newsletter

It was a summer afternoon and I was standing by the registers of the grocery store chatting with the owner. I noticed a boy park his bicycle by the front door. As he entered he went directly to the dairy case and picked up a gallon of milk. He took it to the cashier, laid his \$2.00 on the counter and then with milk and change in hand, he headed for the gumball machines. With care, he placed the gallon jug on top of the gumball dispenser. He put his nickel in the slot and turned the knob. But as the bright red ball came down the shoot, the jug of milk fell on the floor, baptizing everything within five feet of the impact. He froze in place. "Mom gave me \$2 for milk, now its gone!" As fixed as I was on the young boy's mess, I was just as transfixed on my friend, the store owner's, eyes. What would she do? Would she chase the boy from the store telling him to never come back again? Would she lecture him for his clumsiness? Would she give him a mop and bucket and tell him to clean up his mess? Would she send him home empty handed to face the wrath of his mother? What happened next would tell me something about my friend's character. She looked the frightened boy in the eye. That wasn't very wise to put your milk on the gumball machine was it? The boy shook his head. Are you ever going to make that mistake again? He shook his head again. She gave him a towel to dry off and told him to go and get another gallon of milk. He said, "All I had was the \$2." "I know", she replied. She reached into the pocket of her smock, pulled out \$2 and gave it to the cashier to pay for the second gallon of milk. As the boy came back with his milk she told him to be careful going home, and off he went.

It's a story of mercy and grace. That young boy by his foolish actions deserved whatever the store owner would have done or said to him. But she chose to have mercy on him by not giving him a punishment he deserved. At the same time, she chose to show him grace in that she gave him a gift, a new gallon of milk, that he did not deserve. She could have left him to the empty handedness of his poor choice, but instead she chose to restore him.

Last month we considered the reality of our sinfulness—the state in which we find ourselves as a result of our poor choices. They say not to cry over spilt milk, but sometimes the tears cannot help but flow. And as we stand in the puddles, the sour stench makes us miserable. That sad state is not where God wants us to be. Yes, he confronts us in where we have sinned. He calls us to confess where we have gone wrong. But in the confession, he does not condemn us to the point of abandonment. Instead he provides a way for us to be restored, forgiven, offering us a new beginning.

But who cleans up the mess we've made and who pays the price for the next gallon of milk? We can't undo what we've done. We can't pay when we don't have anything left within us. In an act of grace, God pays the price of our sins. He doesn't say— "I'm God, its no big deal to me." Our sin is a big deal to him. He doesn't say, "Ah, forget about it." Our sin has to be paid for. God says, "Someone has to make things right here—you don't have the ability to do that, but I do—I'll pay the price so that justice is done and I'll pay myself by giving myself out of love.

A basic tenet of our faith is that we are all sinners. But God is not content to leave us in our sin, and so he comes to us where and how we are and offers himself as a ransom to set us free. The price for our redemption is far more than any of us could give. But as God gives himself on the cross for our sake, the price is paid in full. God did not sit on his throne and watch what happened on the cross with delight. God himself was on that cross enduring the weight of our sin—mine and yours. The pain, the anguish, the death, the grave were the necessary consequence of our sin. The question becomes—how do we respond to such a gift of grace? How do we show our gratitude for the debt he has paid for us? We respond by living a life of thanksgiving—being to and for others who Jesus is to us...
