There is that part of us that likes to live life by comparison. I may not be perfect, but at least I'm not as bad as she is. I may be overweight, but at least I haven't let myself go like he has. Our home may not be a show place, but at least it doesn't look like the place down the street. Whenever we judge our behavior in comparison to someone else's, we'll always come out on top. The problem is, while we're comparing ourselves to others, someone else is comparing themselves to us—and they're feeling pretty good about the outcome.

As Christians, the standards to which we aspire are not those we observe in others. The standard we seek to meet is that set by God. We can try to meet everyone's expectation of us, but if we do not please God, our lives have missed their purpose. As the catechism teaches, "The chief end of man is to glorify God and enjoy him forever." That is our aim, but we miss the mark. The word used in the Bible for sin, "hamartia" means literally missing the bullseye. Its root is in archery, its spiritual implication is personal.

A basic tenet of our faith is expressed clearly in Romans 3:23, "all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." Before we can enter the relationship into which God invites us, we must come to terms with who we are, and how we are. There is not one of us who is worthy, on our own merits, to approach the Almighty. There is not one of us who is so good, so righteous that we can come face to face with God. Sure, we may not be as consumed by sin as the next guy, but we are tainted just the same. We like to play this spiritual game that says one sin is far worse than another sin. But no where in the Bible do we find a list of what and who is worse. Sin is sin. Whether you've missed the mark by an inch or by a mile—the fact is that you've missed the mark. If you tell your child to be home by 11:00—are they anymore guilty of disobedience coming home at 11:15 than at 2:00 a.m.? Is the little white lie told for convenience any less a lie than one told to cover a heinous crime? Is flirting with temptation anything less than cheating on God?

God calls us into a relationship, to be his and his alone. And anytime we violate his trust, anytime we allow our hearts to stray from a pure devotion to him, we have fallen short. He knows where we've stepped out on him. He knows where our hearts have wondered. He knows our sin even when we don't recognize our sin—yet some how he still wants us. Because of our disobedience, God owes us nothing. But because of his amazing love, he longs to welcome us back. Psalm 51:6 says, "You, Lord, desire truth in the inward being." Before we can be restored in the relationship we must be upfront about where we've gone astray. Before the breach is mended, we must be open about our sin. That's why as we gather for worship, we are intentional about confessing our sin. If we pretend its not there, we take God for a fool. If we can't discern it, then we cannot see God because of the blindness of our hearts.

One of the basic tenets of our faith is the bad news that we are sinners, and we all have fallen short of the glory of God. But the good news is that it's not the end of the story, for God does not leave us alone in the messes we have made. Next month, we see what God does about our miserable state...

GA Overture

There was a group of 10 elders and pastors from our Presbytery who composed an overture to General Assembly proposing a return to the traditional definition of marriage as being between one man and one woman (5 of the 10 were from our congregation). At its September 8th meeting, the Presbytery endorsed the proposal and has sent it to the other 170 presbyteries in the hope that at least one other will concur with it. Should another presbytery concur, the overture will be considered by the General Assembly when it meets in Portland, OR in June 2016.

Family Promise Program

We will host families in the Family Promise Program the week of October 18-25. Many hands are needed to complete the tasks that go along with being a host church. We need meals prepared each evening, a male and female host that will spend the night sleeping on an air mattress, set-up and clean-up crews, and more. On September 17, we hosted a training to make people aware of child abuse issues. Those who attended were educated in how to recognize signs of abuse or exploitation. Prescription Drug Take-Back Program

Why use the Prescription Drug Take-Back Program?

- -It provides individuals with a secure and convenient way to dispose of controlled substances.
- -It prevents misuse and abuse of these substances while being environmentally friendly.
- -Unused prescription medications can be dangerous. After the expiration date, medicines start to lose their effectiveness.
- -Unused medicine is a danger to children. The American Association of Poison Control Centers reported that half of all poisoning exposure in 2011 involved children under age 6.
- -Having multiple prescriptions, especially pain killers, may attract crime or family/friends dealing with addiction.

A permanent disposal box is located at the Blairsville Borough Police Dept. at 203 E. Market Street, 724-459-7555. Hours are 24 hours/7 days a week. Please remove labels.

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Pathway Shelter Donations

Personal care items


New Leadership
