In the closing verse of the Book of Judges, we read, "all the people did what was right in their own eyes." What a sad state of affairs that must have been. Imagine driving a car on streets that had no speed limits or stop signs. Imagine doing your banking where one bank says 2 + 2 = 4 and another says no, 2 + 2 = 5. Imagine making sense of a world in which what is right is defined by what feels good at the moment and what does the most for me. Maybe it doesn't take that much imagination to live in such a world.

Accountability is a word often forgotten in the social and political realm. But it is central to the Christian life. Paul writes, "So then each of us will give an account of himself to God." (Romans 14:12) Ultimately, we have to answer to the One who created us, because we are his. Just as there is that vertical dimension between creator and creature, so too there is a horizontal dimension between us as brothers and sisters in Christ. Because we share faith in Christ, we are connected to one another, "called to rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep." Because as the church we are the body of Christ, we are accountable in the life and work we share. "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up." (I Thessalonians 5:11)

John Wesley one of the founders of the Methodist Church gives us a gift through a series of questions every Christian should be considering about their discipleship. They get to the crux of what it means to be faithful to God, to our oneness in Christ, and to our personal spiritual integrity. How do you answer these questions in truth? Where do you experience Christ's grace? What is it within you that needs to change?

- Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?
- Am I honest in all my acts and words or do I exaggerate?
- Do I confidentially pass on to others what has been said to me in confidence?
- Can I be trusted?
- Am I a slave to dress, friends, work or habits?
- Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or selfjustifying?
- Did the Bible live in me today?
- Do I give the Bible time to speak to me every day?
- Am I enjoying prayer?
- When did I last speak to someone else of my faith?

- Do I pray about the money I spend?
- Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?
- Do I disobey God in anything?
- Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?
- Am I defeated in any part of my life?
- ◆ Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
- ♦ How do I spend my spare time?
- ♦ Am I proud?
- ◆ Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the publican?
- ◆ Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?
- Do I grumble or complain constantly?
- Is Christ real to me?

### Volunteers Needed

Since it has begun in Indiana County, we have been a part of the Family Promise Program, offering homeless families a safe place to stay for four weeks of the year. We make sure they are transported to and from the Day Center in Indiana, they have a well balanced meal each evening and they have comfortable accommodations to get a restful sleep. We are only able to provide these resources because of the volunteers from our congregation. While folks are quick to step forward for transportation and meals, we have had difficulty finding people who are willing to spend the night. Ideally we have two volunteers stay being available to address any emergency that may arise. To date we've never had a problem that needs to be addressed, but we err on the side of caution. While we plan to host two more times this year, (August 12-19 and October 21-28), we are hesitant to commit to hosting families during 2019 unless we have enough people willing to stay overnight. It involves arriving at the church by 7:00 p.m. and then leaving after our guests leave at 8:00 a.m. We only ask that you commit to one night through the week. Please consider taking your turn after all, how often are you encouraged to sleep in church. Let Janet Smith or the church office, 724-459-7991 know of your willingness to help.

# **General Assembly 2018**

June 16-23, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) will convene in St. Louis. This is the 223rd General Assembly. Five hundred thirty eight voting commissioners (an equal number of elders and ministers) and 200 advisory delegates (young adult, missionaries, and seminary students) will gather to consider issues facing the larger church. These representatives come from all over the United States and Puerto Rico. The mix of theological and social issues will be discussed through 13 committees. Each committee makes its report to the entire assembly. Before each vote, the advisory delegates are polled as to their stance on each issue. The Assembly commissioners (elders and ministers) then vote on the issues. If they vote "no," the issue goes no further. They can also vote to send the issue back to the committee for further study. If the Assembly votes "yes," the proposed goes to the various presbyteries seeking their ratification or rejection. Just because a General Assembly votes to endorse a certain action does not mean that it will become policy of the denomination. You can find a schedule of the week's activities by going to www.pcusa.org. All plenary sessions are streamed live.

# **General Assembly Participation**

Each presbytery elects the commissioners they send to the General Assembly. This guarantees a variety of perspectives. The size of a presbytery dictates how many representatives they can send. Because our presbytery has less than 8,000 members, we can send only two commissioners, one elder and one minister. This year, the Rev. Stephanie Weaver of the Sligo Church and Elder David Murphy will be attending and voting. Those who serve as commissioners are not required to vote as they think their presbytery would vote, rather they are to vote their conscience. Their vote should be the result of prayer, scripture study and discussion with brothers and sisters in Christ.

# A Bit of History from Past Assemblies

Pastor Monroe was a Young Adult Delegate in 1975 when the Assembly met in Cincinnati. He also attended as a voting commissioner when the Assembly met in Syracuse, NY. His wife's family has three generations of commissioners. Bobbi's grandfather, the Rev. Homer Becker was a commissioner when it met in Denver, CO in the 1960's. Her father was an elder commissioner in 1975 when it met in Cincinnati. It turns out he was seated two people away from his future son-in-law (Pastor Tim) and they were so busy they never spoke. Bobbi was an elder commissioner when the Assembly met in San Jose, CA. And this year, Bobbi's mother will be an elder commissioner from Tampa Bay Presbytery as they gather in St. Louis Please pray for the 538 elected commissioner, that their discussion would be a true reflection of God's will for His church.

# **Statistical Report**

The 2017 Annual Statistical Report for Kiskiminetas Presbytery reflects that we currently have 6,636 active members (which includes 4 Asian, 9 African-American, 9 Hispanic and 13 others). Total Church School enrollment is 1,595. There were 53 baptisms of children and 9 baptisms of adults. Total 2017 receipts for our 79 congregations was \$8,386,974.



## **Rwanda Churches**

As you have read earlier, in March of this year, the Rwandan government began closing churches across the country. Some of the closings were out of safety concern because of the structural conditions of buildings. Some of the closings were of a political nature because the government was concerned that large gatherings of people opens the door to political dissent. Gitarama Presbytery, with whom we have a partnership, has 93 worship areas (39 parishes and 54 chapels). Ten of the parishes and 26 of the chapels have completely closed, while 29 parishes and 28 chapels have been required to undertake some renovations. Between now and the end of 2019, our presbytery hopes to raise \$50,000 to assist our partner churches to bring their facilities up to code.
