As you receive this letter we are still in the season of Easter. Just as there are twelve days of Christmas, there are forty days of Easter. In Acts 1:3, Luke tells us, "After his suffering Jesus presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God." Those who saw Jesus on the cross and then a week later saw him walking the streets— "convincing proof" would be an understatement. John probably tells us more about those post resurrection appearances then any one. As he concludes his gospel account, he testifies, "There are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written." Who can add the number of lives that have been touched as witness tells another, who tells another, who tells another, and one generation tells the next, who tells the next.....and so we hear the good news.

Paul's encounter with the risen Christ comes on the road to Damascus. In I Corinthians 15, he tells us that Jesus was seen by over 500 people, many of whom were still alive when he was. They say you can't keep a good man down, and the resurrection is proof of that. Those forty days were truly a blessing to the ones who experienced them personally, and for the faith that was fostered—a faith that is a part of the foundation on which we build.

But as Jesus was raised from the dead, it was not the Father's intention for the Son to stay in the world forever. Jesus was clear throughout his earthly sojourn that this was not his home, and that just as he was sent by the Father, so he would return to him. On the fortieth day Jesus instructs the disciples about the responsibilities of being his followers. They were called and promised power to do the work of ministry—to be witnesses to the truth of who Jesus is, to go and make disciples who will also follow, to baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit welcoming others into the household of faith, and teaching what it means to be obedient to the commands of faithfulness. That is our commission to service to this day.

As Jesus spoke these words he was taken in a cloud, right before the eyes of those gathered. Two "men in white robes", angels I suspect, assured them that just as Jesus had been taken up in a cloud, so we would see him coming down from heaven some day. And so we say, "He ascended into heaven and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty, from thence he shall come to judge the quick (the living) and the dead." The catechism teaches that there are three benefits afforded us in Jesus' ascension: First, we now have an advocate in the presence of our Father in heaven—a direct connection to the Father. Secondly, just as we are a part of Jesus and he is a part of us by our abiding, now a part of us is in heaven. And thirdly, since Jesus is in heaven, we are able to receive the fruit of the promise he made around the table (John 14) about the impending Counselor, Comforter who would be sent to us.

After he was taken up, the disciples remembered that he told them to go to the room upstairs, the upper room, their gathering place of sorts—and once there, to wait. They weren't sure what they were waiting for, but they knew they trusted it was something, someone good. I sometimes think about that period of waiting. The Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit were together in heaven while in faith the believers waited patiently. The chair once occupied by the Risen Lord was empty. The words of the Risen Lord were but an echo in their hearts. The promise made by the Risen Lord was yet to be fulfilled. Was there a sense of abandonment, a sense of doubt revived, an anticipation of fear mixed with wonder, a complete surrender to whatever would be? There they waited remembering the promise, "I will not leave you desolate, orphaned."

One day, two days, five days, eight days, and on the tenth day it happened. From heaven, suddenly came the rush of a mighty wind. It filled the house where they were gathered. Tongues, as of fire, appeared among them resting on each one of them. And they began to speak in other languages. The Holy Spirit had arrived, yet another promise had been fulfilled, and God was again in the midst of his people, binding them, binding us together.

This merry, merry month of May is truly a time of celebration as we experience Easter, the Ascension and Pentecost. Sense the hand of God and the rhythm of God's abiding presence in your midst and rejoice in the ways God moves us together in the fulfillment of his marvelous promises.....

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May is Mental Health Awareness Month

Early Warning Signs of Mental Illness in Older Adults

According to the World Health Organization, 15% of adults age 60 and over suffer from a mental disorder. While most have good mental health, many older adults are at risk of developing mental health disorders. Prompt recognition and treatment of mental health issues in older adults is essential. Unfortunately, many people confuse symptoms of mental illness with normal signs of aging. Being aware of some of the warning signs of mental illness can help to make detection easier for loved ones and caregivers. Here are some early warning signs to watch out for:

- Memory Issues/Confusion—persistent forgetfulness, inability to manage finances, disoriented, problems concentrating, repeatedly asking the same question.
- ♦ Changes in Personal Care—Noticeable changes in appearance, problems maintaining hygiene, not dressing appropriately for the weather.
- ♦ Social Withdrawal—Loss of interest in activities, leaving home less often, not answering phone calls.
- Mood Changes—Feelings of sadness, worthlessness, hopelessness, guilt, excessive worry, feeling flat or emotionless, irritability, aggression.
- Changes in Thoughts and Behaviors—Obsessive thinking, disordered thoughts, paranoia, thoughts of hurting self or others, compulsive behavior, substance use/abuse, engaging in high-risk activities, bizarre behaviors.
- ♦ Changes in Sleep Pattern—Unexplained fatigue, energy loss, sleeping too much, insomnia.
- ♦ Changes in Appetite/Weight—Poor appetite, increased appetite, significant weight gain or loss.

If you know of an older adult who is experiencing symptoms of an acute psychiatric illness, please seek professional help. Services are available at local hospitals. In case of an emergency, please call 911 or the Crisis Hotline at 877-333-2470.
