I was blessed with a wonderful childhood, ideal in every way. Every room of the house brings back memories that warm my heart. As with most homes, after Thanksgiving the halls were bedecked with holiday decorations. Candles filled each window with light, Christmas cards lined the banisters, a nativity set was the focal point of the living room, stockings hung on the fireplace mantle, elves on the shelves kept vigilant guard, and a brightly lit tree adorned the family room. Christmas morning meant rising early, but before we were allowed to see our gifts, we had to wait until the camera was set up and all the packages were in their proper place. To this day, I can see my sister and me sitting on the top step anticipating what had been placed under the tree for us. Would it be exactly as the advertisements showed it? Would it be put together and ready to play with? Would everything on my list be there? Would my pile be bigger than my sister's? Would there be more toys than underwear and socks? While the wait time was about ten minutes, it seemed like ten hours. And then we heard the long awaited invitation, "Okay, you two can come down now." Each year is documented on film. If you like I can loan them to you for your family enjoyment (or not).

This season of Advent is a time of waiting with eager anticipation for the fulfillment of our heart's longing. Thousands of years ago, God promised his people that he would come to them in a special way. Through the prophets he spoke of the hope of a coming peace and joy. He foretold of an abiding love, a light in the midst of our darkness that would dispel our fear, and sadness, and tears. The people of old didn't know exactly <a href="https://www.mould.com">how God would come</a>, but in faith they knew <a href="https://www.mould.com">hat he would come</a>. And so, for years, for centuries they watched and waited and wondered when.

Our celebration of Christmas is a witness to God's faithfulness. He promised he would come, and he did. And so earth shaking, so earth transforming was his arrival that the birth of Jesus changed how we mark time itself, BC and AD. In his coming, God understands us all the more—our questions, challenges, dreads, helplessness. Jesus understands our wrestling with sin and its consequences. Even though he did not succumb to the power of sin, he knew the reality of temptation. We call Jesus, Emmanuel, which means "God with us" and in every sense of that name God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit know our daily reality. God came to us, not because he had to. God without us is still every bit God. Rather God came to us because he wanted to, because he loves us and wants us to know and love him. So, God made a promise and he kept it, end of story—or not!

We know Jesus came, died, rose and ascended to heaven where he is enthroned on the right hand of the Father. But we also are given the promise, the assurance that Jesus will come again. As he came in lowliness and humility, he came to show us God's love and mercy and grace. He came to set us free from our sin and to knock down the dividing wall between God and humanity. When he comes again, he will come to judge the nations. As the God of love, God is also the King of Justice and the Lord of Righteousness. As the creator of all that is, he had the right, the responsibility to have the final word over creation. When he comes again, he will come in power and glory. Jesus will descend from the clouds, and unlike his arrival in Bethlehem, all the world will know that he has returned.

That is good news to the faithful, and we will welcome him because he is our Lord. But for those who do not acknowledge his lordship his return is not as welcomed. The question we consider in this Advent Season is—Where will we be found when he comes? Is there anything about our lives that will be condemned in the judgment? Are any of our relationships void of his love and mercy? Is there anything we would seek to hide in the hope he would not notice? Is there any part of us that we have not surrendered to him and his service?

Just as the coming of Jesus has made our hearts glad and filled our souls with hope and peace and joy and love—so too the assurance of his return is good news. Watch for him with an expectant spirit. Wait for him with an anticipation for the justice he brings. Live each day to his glory, prepared to be found as a bride adorned for her beloved. Maranatha, Come, Lord Jesus. Come and make your kingdom complete....
