The gang from the Peanuts comic strip were gathered around the Thanksgiving table reflecting on the blessings they've received. Linus, clutching a blanket, expressed his gratitude for God's gift of security. Schroeder delighted in God's gift of music, Snoopy rejoiced in the gift of a vivid imagination and all the adventures it affords him, and Woodstock, Snoopy's fine feathered friend, gave thanks that he was not born a turkey.

With grateful hearts we thank God for the goodness he has put into our lives. But so too we are mindful of those things he has spared us of. We don't have to look very far to count our blessings, and at the same time to recognize the hardships of others. Paul's counsel in I Thessalonians 5:18 is "In everything give thanks, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." In his letters he recounts the tough times he endures: "five times I received forty lashes minus one, three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, one night—and a day I floated in the open sea, I have been constantly on the move and in harm's way..." (II Corinthians 11:24ff). "For I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well fed and of going hungry.....I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:11ff) The Christian life is not defined by what we call God's goodness, rather by the fortitude of faith received in the face of adversity. In the midst of his losses Job declares, "Naked I came from my mother's womb and naked I shall depart. The Lord gives and the Lord takes away, blessed be the name of the Lord." (Job 1:21)

There are those who go through life with a sense of entitlement. They feel they are owed the fullness of God's bountiful hand (and everything in the hands of those around them). And when you see yourself as the center of the universe you're bound to be disappointed when your expectations of the world are not met. The fact of the matter is that we are owed nothing from the world or from God. From that perspective, everything we do receive is a gift. And every gift requires a response, an acknowledgment and a giving of thanks.

In our Reformed tradition, there are two words that are inseparable—grace and gratitude. You can't have one without the other. Where God initiates a relationship we are called to respond. We love because God first loves us. We forgive because we have been forgiven. We are gracious because we have been shown grace. We are merciful because God has been merciful to us. I like the cartoon that depicts a husband and wife standing in line at the pearly gates. She warns him, "Now George, whatever you do—don't demand what's coming to you." "The wages of sin are death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

As those redeemed in Christ, we have been given a marvelous gift—a future of hope. The way we live our lives here and now is a "thank you" note to God for all he has done and will do. Thanks living is at the heart of thanksgiving. We often affirm our faith on Sunday morning with the words of the first question of the Heidelberg Catechism— "What is your only comfort in life and in death? - That I am not my own, but belong body and soul, in life and in death to my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ..." The second question of the catechism follows, "What must you know to live and die in the joy of this comfort? - Three things: first, how great my sin and misery are; second, how I am set free from all my sins and misery; third, how I am to thank God for such deliverance."

As you see what is happening in the world around you, do you respond as Jesus responded to the chaos in your life? In your relationships, do you deal with others as God has dealt with you? In your circumstances, do you trust that God is in control and works all things for the ultimate good? Are you mindful of all that God has saved you from and all that God has saved you for?

With gratitude we respond to the grace by which we have been made right with God. In that gratitude may all you do bring him glory and praise.....

Christmas Cantata



Mission Moment

It's your birthday. The phone rings. While it could be a family member or a friend wishing you well on your special day, the last thing you might expect to hear is a 99-year-old man on the other end of the call singing "Happy Birthday" to you. But that's exactly what happens to those who attend Westminster Presbyterian Church in Greensboro, NC, where Carl Webb has found his purpose, his "call" so to speak, in serving God. And that "call" is to be the birthday crooner of the church.

In all of the 18 years of this unique ministry, Webb has had only five days off. And that's only because on those days he didn't have anyone to sing "Happy Birthday" to, he says. He's kept track of the number of calls he has made over the years. "I've done between 35,000 and 36,000 'Happy Birthday' calls to people at my church—even strangers," Webb said. More than 2,000 people attend his church. Webb estimates that he averages six calls a day.

His ministry started when he began attending church with his daughter, Betsy Hyslop. He noticed church secretaries taking a sheet of paper from a packet on one of the church's walls. Webb asked his daughter what they were doing. His daughter replied that it was a list of birthdays for the month—for all of the people who went to church. "I thought, 'Doggone it, you love to sing,'" Webb said. "You can sing 'Happy Birthday' to people." He asked for a copy of the birthday list, and the "Birthday Man" was born.

"He couldn't walk and see as well as he once did," said Hyslop. "He was trying to find something he could do for the church." Once people in the church knew who was singing—and why—word spread beyond the church family. Even people Hyslop didn't know were trying to get on her father's "Happy Birthday" singing list. On Webb's 99th birthday this past May, Westminster Presbyterian Church did something special for the famous birthday man: The entire congregation sang "Happy Birthday" to him. The song was followed with a standing ovation and thunderous clapping. "It was a great joy to know people remembered me on my birthday, in the same way that I remember them," Webb said.
