Allison Harrell is an artist who uses words to express the realities so many face in this world. Of her own experience she writes:

"I am lost in blindness And I refuse to believe that I can see One has to accept a life of darkness Years from now I can only tell my children not to believe that Simple grace triumphs over utter darkness I was born in sin and I was conceived in sin It doesn't matter to God that I live every day of my life in hopelessness No longer can it be said that There is a god who hears the cry of his people My whole life testifies to this one truth Blindness has robbed me of every good thing And it is no longer true that God saves those who are crushed in spirit Now I do not know much but I know one thing for sure I was born blind with no hope and no future"

It is in such a darkness, such a blindness, such a hopelessness that many dwell. The words are descriptive of the groove into which we are pressed or baited. Yes, Allison is a perceptive artist—but even more she is a Christian, so she adds another line to her poem. It reads,

"But then I met Jesus and he turned everything in my life upside down."

It is that punchline that is the grand reversal we call resurrection. Take the words with which she ended and see them as a new beginning.

"I was born blind with no hope and no future Now I don't know much but I know one thing for sure God saves those who are crushed in spirit And it is no longer true that Blindness has robbed me of every good thing My whole life testifies to this one truth There is a god who hears the cry of his people No longer can it be said that I live every day of my life in hopelessness It doesn't matter to God that I was born in sin and I was conceived in sin Simple grace triumphs over utter darkness Years from now I can only tell my children not to believe that One has to accept a life of darkness I can see And I refuse to believe that I am lost in blindness."

"We are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people that we would declare the wonderful deeds of him who called us out of darkness into his marvelous light—for once we were not a people but now we are God's people. Once we had not received mercy, but now we have received it." (I Peter 2:9-10) Our identity is not defined by who we were, but rather it is transformed by who we are becoming. Ours is not a descent into darkness, but rather an ascent into the brightness of God's glory.

Together we have journeyed through the season of Lent. Together we watched as Jesus endured the passion of the cross and the seeming abandonment of the grave. Together we have greeted the Risen Lord and been offered the power of resurrection. Together we have rejoiced in his homecoming as he was welcomed to the right hand of the Father. And together we find hope in the blessed assurance that there he has prepared a place for us—forever...
