There is an old saying: “If you chase two rabbits, they both will escape you.” From experience, we know that is true in our personal lives, in our household relationships, and as a family of faith. Its possible being so busy doing that we lose sight of who we are—because we have lost a vision of why we are. Solomon, in his wisdom, writes, “Where there is no vision, the people perish.” (Proverbs 29:18 KJV) While we are in many ways the product of our past, being recreated in the image of Christ we are continually becoming someone new, someone fuller, someone refashioned into who God calls us to be. Faithful discipleship requires us to seek understanding how we are no longer who we were and how we are not yet who we should be. Therein, faith is a journey, an adventure for us as individuals and collectively as the church.

The Session is comprised of those called out by God through the voice of the congregation to serve as ruling elders. “Ruling elders, are so named not because they ‘lord it over the congregation (Matthew 20:25),’ but because they are called to discern and measure the congregations fidelity (faithfulness) to the Word of God.” As such, the Session calls us to a season of visioning as together we seek to understand where we’ve been, who we are and where the Holy Spirit is leading us. Leading the process requires an objective point of view. Just as a person who defends themselves in court has a fool for a client, just as a pastor cannot effectively minister to their own family, just as a surgeon cannot operate on their own child, we need someone who is free of biases to help us in this task.

We will be using a resource developed by Healthy Congregations, Inc. (www.healthycongregations.com). The Rev. Kathy Nice of the Community Presbyterian Church in Shelocta has been trained in the program and will facilitate our use of it. While the Session will be participating, we also hope that some of you will be led to be involved as well.

There are three workshops to be completed over a period of one year or more. Each workshop is five to six hours of face to face time with group work after the workshop ends. Instead of doing the 5-6 hours in one day, we will split it between two three-hour consecutive evenings.

Workshop 1: Creating Healthy Congregations, introduces the basics of systems thinking and looks at building capabilities to accept differences while focusing on organizational strength and mission. Here we examine how the Blairsville congregation functions as a body of believers—how we interact or don’t interact—how we are the same and how we are different—where we are strong and where we need to be strengthened. The objective is to develop mission and vision guides for the congregation.

Workshop 2: Healthy Congregations Responds to Anxiety and Change, focuses on identifying and dealing with anxiety in communities, management of conflict, and developing capabilities to be flexible and creative through it all. It is not the intention to poke and prod until we can find or create problems to solve, but there is within any organization some stress and anxiety. In identifying the stressors we can begin to move past them in a healing way. We are not looking to change for the sake of change, rather we are seeking to discover any new direction to which we are being called.


Workshop 3: Leadership in Healthy Congregations works on the development of healthier processes by looking at how leaders function, rather than through programs and techniques. We will be looking at the role leaders play in providing immunity to processes that tear down the fabric of community. Here we examine our life together as a team and how we can work together more effectively.

There are three additional workshops if there is interest in exploring them, but at this point we are committed to the first three.

Any one of you would be valuable to this process, but we know that life can be very busy. If you are interested in taking part, we ask that you make it a priority and participate fully in the discussion and work. Workshop 1 will be held Wednesday and Thursday evenings, November 13 & 14 from 6:00-9:00 in Fellowship Hall. More information will be coming. Mission Moment—*Church's heart for mission helps homeless and even pets*

Calvary Presbyterian Church has had a heart for mission ever since a group of friends gathered in 1944 seeking to have a church closer to their home — in what was then a growing suburb of southwest Wilmington, Delaware. Today, the long legacy of helping neighbors continues with partnerships with organizations like Meeting Ground, a local group addressing homelessness, and Friendship House, which offers transitional housing, a clothing bank and “empowerment centers,” providing those in need with a place to regroup, work on resumes, have a cup of coffee and connect with others. But Wilmington is a big city with lots of opportunities to help others. So, Calvary Presbyterian created what is called “Second Sunday Sharing,” in which the congregation helps one local nonprofit. “It’s a time where we learn a little about the organization,” said the Rev. Holly Clark-Porter. “We then bring forward tangible items that will help that organization during the last hymn.” On a recent Second Sunday Sharing, the items brought forward were large bags of dog food, dog biscuits and treats for felines. The items were to help feed animals at the Faithful Friends Animal Society, a privately funded no-kill shelter. “Faithful Friends does so much for Wilmington and for animals. We are so heartened by their work,” Clark-Porter said.

Dear Friends and Family,

Greetings from rainy Rwanda. September activities are different from the normal schedule, because of the schedule and because of the rains. The Protestant Institute of Arts and Social Sciences (PIASS) is on a break from classes, with our theology students doing internships in their home parishes, but that is not to say that we are not busy. This is a month for visitors and conferences. We have hosted delegations from Japan and Germany and conferences on theology and ethics, on peace building, on history and on interreligious relations. This is also the beginning of the rainy season that provides anything from a light sprinkle of rain to several hours of soaking downpours each day.

In mid-September we had a delegation of 26 German students and lecturers from Bochum University come for a series of lectures at PIASS and a conference at Lake Kivu. Some of our students were invited to return to participate. We welcomed our guests, gave them a tour of the campus and escorted them to lunch at the student restaurant across from the main campus, after which we were to return to the main campus for a public lecture by one of the visiting professors at 3 p.m. But as frequently happens on African time, we were behind schedule and lunch did not begin until 2 p.m. As we were finishing lunch and encouraging folks to make their way for the lecture, the skies darkened and there was a loud clap of thunder. Several of us rushed to the lecture room before the storm broke, but most lingered to finish the last of the meal. Just as I reached the main building, the heavens opened, and the rains poured. Most of the delegation did not have umbrellas. Rwandans would just wait for the rain to stop and then move to the lecture. But our guests were not accustomed to this practice, so we sent the bus on which the guests had come to the student area to gather the guests and ride them the 200 yards in the pouring rain. All this took time. When the lecture began at 4 p.m., the speaker, Dr Wolfgang Huber, a renowned German theologian, had to raise his voice above the pounding rain on the roof, but everyone was satisfied. The lecture, *Ethics in an Emergency: The case of Dietrich Bonhoeffer*, was a great success. By the time all questions were answered, the rain had stopped, and we could continue with the program of the evening. Such is life in September at PIASS.

My hope for you is that your September has been as enjoyable and that you are anticipating God's blessings in October. Please pray for our students as they return to classes this month and for the recruitment of the new students who will join us. They are the future of PIASS and the church.
