Once again we find ourselves in the midst of seasonal change. The variety of weather and temperature is one of the many things I enjoy about living here. The cold of Winter helps me appreciate the heat of Summer. The barrenness of Autumn makes me look forward to the new life of Spring. There is a beauty in the rhythm of nature, an ebb and flow of the anticipation of what comes next. There is a sense of order in the cycle of life.

While the world lives out the patterns of worldly change, as a people of faith we enjoy the drama of the spiritual story of God's hand in the lives of his children. Through the centuries, the faithful have moved to the rhythm of the church seasons. The new church year began on December 1 with the First Sunday of Advent. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin "adventus," meaning "coming." It's a time when the Christian church has looked back to the prophets of old, to their telling assurance that God would come to his people to save them. Their message offers a word of hope, a promise of peace, a celebration of joy and an expression of God's love for his children. Together we remember how God sent his law, but we disregarded it. So, God sent prophets, but we turned a deaf ear. So God chose to come in the flesh to dwell with us. During this season we look back and remember God's faithfulness.

But so too, this is a season of looking ahead in eager anticipation that just as Jesus came, lived with us, died for us, rose in victory and ascended in glory—he will one day return and take us unto himself in the fullness of the Kingdom. The Second Coming is referred to as the "Parousia" which is the Greek word for "coming." The promise of Jesus' return gives us hope and peace and joy and the beauty of God's unending love.

Each Sunday of Advent we take time to light the candles that chase away the darkness and illuminate our vision of the Lord. The brightness of the flames crescendo as the center white Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve and the darkness is pierced and scattered and we are set free to welcome our newborn King. Its no wonder the candle held in our hands and the sound of Silent Night on our lips and in our ears touch our hearts. It is a moment when we are together in knowing that everything will be alright. Yet we are forgetful creatures and the assurances of hope, peace, joy and love leave our minds and we once again find ourselves back in the shadows.

But each year we are called back to the light. Each year we cry out "O Come, O Come Emmanuel and ransom captive Israel." It is sung and prayed in a mournful tone, for the cry to be saved comes from a fearful heart. Ancient Israel sang in expectation of Messiah's first coming. We, the Church, sing in anticipation of Christ's return.

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here, until the Son of God appear.

O come, thou Dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by thine advent here; disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight.

O come, thou Wisdom from on high, and order all things, far and nigh; to us the path of knowledge show, and cause us in her ways to go.

O come, Desire of nations, bind all peoples in one heart and mind; bid envy, strife and quarrels cease; fill the whole world with heaven's peace.

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!

In this season and in all seasons may you know you are set free and kept secure in the hands of your Redeemer....

Update from Kay Day

Greetings to all,

Thanksgiving is over and many of you are beginning the rush for Christmas. Life in Rwanda is very different from that in the States at this time of year. First, the country does not celebrate Thanksgiving, but that didn't prevent me from doing so. The menu was a bit different (no turkey or cranberries or pumpkin pie) but the spirit was the same. Since there are no Americans with whom I am close here in Huye, I did the next best thing and invited folks I thought could appreciate the tradition. There are two visiting German professors teaching at the Protestant Institute of Arts and Social Sciences (PIASS) at present. Both have traveled and studied in the States, so I invited them. Then, two of our masters' students and former students of mine are studying and are away from their families, so I invited them. Because one of the Germans was traveling on Thursday, we eat our meal on Wednesday evening. None of these differences prevented us from having a great feast and enjoying a time of sharing our blessings and thanking God for them. It was a great time.

There is no Black Friday here, either. In fact, shopping and gift giving is not emphasized at all. Most people will shop a day or so before Christmas for special food and new clothes for Christmas Day – no elaborate gift giving. The shops are not decorated with Santa or trees and there is no "White Christmas" or "Jingle Bells" in the background. No one decorates their houses with lights or trees. It is business as usual until December 24. Then it will be impossible to get a bus ticket because everyone will be traveling home for worship and food together. For me, business as usual is teaching. I will begin an intense weekend course with the new English course. This means teaching our Education students Friday evening from 6-9 and Saturday all day, 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m., with an hour for lunch and an hour for dinner. There will be 50 students packed into the multimedia center, designed for 30 students, for an interactive, multimedia teaching. I have just finished this course with the Theology and Peace students, and they enjoyed the format. We'll see about the education folks.

My pastoral duties are much the same as any pastor in the States – Advent focus, encouraging folks to keep their eyes on Jesus' coming rather than the activities around them. While Advent is not widely observed throughout Rwanda, we in the English chapel celebrate it. The chapel is really a "lab school" for my students, since I teach preaching and worship leadership. Interestingly, I have gotten text messages from several of my former students who are now serving churches, asking for the liturgy for Advent. That is an encouragement to my heart.

However you are occupied in this time between Thanksgiving and Christmas, I pray that you are drawn closer to Christ, the one who gives us light and life and joy this season and always. Thank you for partnering with me and making it possible for me to be here. You bless me by your support. Without you, I could not be here. May this Advent open your eyes more fully to the love of Christ.
