If someone came up to you and asked, "Tell me about yourself, who are you?", how would you answer? There are many ways to approach self description. It could be in terms of the work you do, the past-times you enjoy, the relationships you maintain. It could be your cultural heritage, your politics, your emotional state of mind. Each of us are the culmination of dozens, if not hundreds, of factors. But if you were asked to choose which one best defines your self-identity, which would it be?

As people of faith, we well may respond, "I am a child of God." The things of this world may describe our life style, but the essence of our lives is found in our spiritual DNA. Scripture is clear that before anything of this world existed, God knew that each of us would be. In Psalm 139, David declares, "It was you who formed my inward parts, you knit me together in my mother's womb...your eyes beheld my unformed substance. In your book were written all the days that were formed for me, when none of them as yet existed." As different as the variety of people who have trod this soil, we all have one thing in common—we were created by the same God. No matter when we were born, where we were raised, what our social standing, we have in common the reality that we are creatures, made in the image of our Creator.

Genesis 126, "Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness:" Does that imply that each of us are little gods? No, but what it does tell us is that we have a special relationship with God, a capacity to know God, to feel God, to enjoy God, to reflect the nature of our Creator in all we do. The Psalmist askes, "What are humans that thou art mindful of him, and mortals that thou doest care for them? Yet you have made them a little lower than God, and crowned them with glory and honor." (Psalm 8). Of all the creatures that God made, we are special. Into us was breathed the breath of life. To us was given the ability to reason and rationalize. To us was given a soul whereby we can sense the presence of God and commune with him as he guides us. To us has been given a moral capacity to know right from wrong and to act accordingly. To us was given the power to have dominion over the rest of the natural world. But with each of these gifts comes a responsibility to use them reasonably, not for ourselves but for God's glory and praise.

Having been created in the image of God leads some to become arrogant in their position, elitist in their approach to life. But the reality is that we are all creatures, and not one of us is more precious in the sight of God than another. It was the same breath of God that gave life to Adam that gave life to a peasant 3,000 years ago, that gave life to a king 1,000 years ago, that gave life to you. While we were given dominion over creation, we are not given dominion over each other. God loves and wants those who may never speak his name as much as he loves and wants us. The promises he has extended to us are also offered to those we want no part of. God does not have favorites. To be sure he is pleased with those who love and serve and honor and praise him, but he is also concerned for those who do not. In his compassion he reaches out to them and calls them to respond and to return to him with all their heart that the relationship would be restored. And as those who know we have been created in his likeness, we too work for that restoration. Remember, the same Jesus who died for your sins also died for the sins of those you think unworthy. The grace with which God set you free is the same grace God calls you to work for the freedom and peace of others.

It's all about relationships, God reaching out to us and us responding by reaching out to him and to others (whoever they may be). God's love transcends those worldly things that are used to define us. Our identity is firmly rooted in the one who called us out to be his own. Be to others as God in Christ has been to you, and welcome the freshness of his Spirit as he strengthens your hands, guides your feet and opens your heart.....

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## Compassion's Work in Rwanda and COVID-19

An in-depth look at the coronavirus pandemic in Rwanda

Rwanda is reporting 98 new cases of COVID-19 per day as of May 2, down from 170 recorded on April 6. So far, enough COVID-19 vaccines have been administered to vaccinate around 1.4% of its population of 12.7 million people. The government continues to mandate precautionary health measures, including frequent hand-washing and social distancing. Face masks must be worn not only in public but also in multifamily compounds. Schools and universities have reopened. The government announced a plan to more than triple its Economic Recovery Fund to support businesses that have been impacted by the pandemic.

Child development centers in Rwanda are open only for small group meetings of children and youths. Staff are careful to take COVID-19 prevention measures and follow local guidelines. **They have been able to deliver over 84,500 food packs and almost 534,000 hygiene kits to children and families.** Additionally, they have helped over 55,000 individuals obtain medical support.
