About four weeks ago, polished stones embossed with a cross were made available to you. I hope you selected one to your liking from the baskets in the sanctuary and have been carrying it with you through the Lenten Season. Sometimes inanimate objects point to important life lessons. The Bible contains over ninety references to stones, stones that mark boundaries, stones that serve as monuments, stones that lie in ruin, stones that serve as a foundation, stones that bedeck priestly breastplates, stones that adorn royal crowns, stones that slay dangerous enemies, stones that honor cherished relationships, stones that are meant to be unmovable, stones that crumble with the utterance of a holy word, stones that cause some to stumble, stones that lift some to new heights.

As we move closer to Holy Week, we come to terms with a stone that has confronted every soul of every generation that has travelled this sod since Jesus ventured this earth. The confrontation is not a matter of the size of the stone, but rather the world's perception of the stone's power. Medieval philosophers mused over some peculiar questions: How many angels can dance on the head of a pin? If a tree falls in the forest and there is no one there to hear it, did it make a noise? If God can do anything, can God create a stone so large that even he cannot move it?

In a few days we will revisit Jerusalem where Jesus' lifeless body was removed from a cross. John tells us how two secret disciples, Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus received permission to take possession of the corpse. The two wrapped Jesus' body with spices in linen cloths and placed it in an unused tomb in which no one had ever been laid. Matthew tells us that Joseph rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and then went away. The Gospel accounts are consistent in their testimony that the women witnessed this event.

A body that was lifeless. An entrance that was sealed tight. Eye witnesses who concur on who laid dead in the tomb. Was the stone solid enough evidence to end the story in the heads and minds of those present? Was that stone powerful enough to dash the hopes of those who had followed Jesus? Even more important, is there a stone big enough to stop you in your faith journey?

It is God alone who breathes life into the lifeless. It is God alone who moves obstacles that obstruct hope. It is God alone who enlivens that which has died within us and moves us from a life among tombstones to a future among living stones that become a spiritual home. While the resurrection of Jesus is an historical event, it is more fully a way of life for us who believe and follow him. What happened within that tomb, unseen by human eyes, has forever unlived the hearts of those who dare to trust that such a power is made real in us.

To those in Jerusalem that day who resigned themselves to the sight of a stone sealed tomb, life continued with an "it is what it is" attitude. Everyday victimized them by their circumstances. Nothing new ever happened because they could not escape the grip of their past. The thrill of a dream never stirred their heart because their dashed hope forbade them from considering the possibility. To surrender to an "it is what it is" mentality is to leave Jesus in his tomb while we retire to our own.

The joy of Easter Day is that there is no stone so big that God cannot move it. There is no prison, self-made or worldly imposed, so strong that it keeps us in bondage. There is no failure so defeating that we cannot get up and start again. There is no pain so deep that we cannot find a comfort that gives us the courage to move forward, even if it is only an inch from where we were yesterday.

As Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James, and Salome made their way to the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus, they lamented, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" Oh the time we waste fretting that which God has already resolved. As you hold your stone in your hand, remember the stones God has moved from your path. Be mindful of the hinderances he will remove from your tomorrows. You are not a prisoner to your past, your sin is forgiven. You are not a victim of your circumstance, you are being recreated day by day. As a living stone, you are a vital part of the household of faith, built into a spiritual house to be a holy people. Being found in the risen Lord, know that the power and freedom of resurrection is God's gift to you, without end.....


Community Lenten Services



In April of 1918, the pastor was the Rev. Michael McDivitt. The world was at war and had been since July of 1914. Below is the pastor's letter from The Yearly Bulletin dated April 1, 1918. (This booklet is equivalent to our Annual Report and Directory combined.) Read his words of comfort for his flock.

THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

We send out this Yearly Bulletin under severe and terrifying condi-tions. Our sons, our husbands, our brothers, and our kinsmen are in large numbers now in the service of our country waging a just war for the defense of our National Honor and the safety of humanity throughout the whole world. But this is not all—many have gone from us and the whole world. But this is not all many have gone from us and many more will go during the coming days.

Your minister takes this opportunity to say to his people that his prayers go up unceasingly for all who have sent loved ones to the war. His prayer is that God will be gracious to us and to our loved ones in what-ever place He may call us.

My Brethren, these are trying days and days that should keep us all very close to God. Let us all in prayer and service become acquainted with God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost, for once we are acquainted with God we will be at peace in the very midst of all that this World War may bring to us.


Turn in your Bibles to Isaiah 58:11 and you will read these inspiring words: "And the Lord shall guide thee continually". It seems that such words were written for this very time and for this very congregation. With these gracious, comforting, inspiring words I want to couple Susie L. Spencer's soul penetrating poem.

"Give me grace, dear Lord, to be One with Thee in service sweet; Dearer may it be to me, Dearer may it be to me, Still to wait and watch for Thee. With Thy hand enfolding mine, In the day or in the night, Let me hear Thy voice Divine; Lead me through the dark to light. So as days and years go by, May thy will be done in me; Hear me when to Thee I cry, Cuide me hear me aloce to Thee" Guide me, keep me close to Thee."

We suggest that you read this Yearly Bulletin very carefully. You will then observe, from the reports, that this is our best year in this church in many respects. We are all very grateful to God for leading us to such heights of usefulness, but at the same time we must all realize the respon-sibility that rests upon us. The First Presbyterian Church of Blairsville will under God not only retain the ground won, but she will "Go Forward" and occupy by spiritual conquest new and larger territory.

He has always been a faithful Christian and zealous worker for the peace and harmony of the Church. He has been faithful through many years and may the Lord permit him to continue his faithfulness in actual work through many years to come. This is his fifty-first year as a ruling elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Blairsville.

- **When you're stressed, your imagination can help. Call to mind sounds that calm you—a babbling brook, birds chirping, a favorite song—and let them lead you to an inner place where you can hear the still, small voice of God.
- 2.Suppose you were told that you could have one wish come true—but the wish you make would have to be for someone else, not for yourself. What would you wish for, and for whom would you with it?
- **Empathy is a fundamental building block for all moral growth. Make it a family value to frequently consider how your behavior and choices affect others. When your child talks about other children's experiences, gently ask, "And how do you think he/she felt about that?" This will nurture you child's capacity for compassion.
