It was their golden anniversary as Bert and Gert sat at the head table of the packed banquet hall. Family and friends had gathered from near and far to celebrate the glorious occasion. Bert stood to make a toast. "My dear wife, after fifty years I've found you tried and true." Everyone smiled with approval. But Gert forgot her hearing aid so she said "Eh?" Again Bert raised his glass and said in a louder voice, "AFTER FIFTY YEARS I'VE FOUND YOU TRIED AND TRUE!" His wife harumphed and shot back, "Well, let me tell you something—after fifty years I'm tired of you, too!"

Long-term relationships are a blessing filled with memories—most of which are reasons to celebrate, but some we would rather forget. But regardless of the emotions we express, we move forward, trusting that it is God who holds for us a glorious future. Our two hundred years of witness in Blairsville have been filled with highs and lows, the highs far outnumbering the challenges. Through it all, the tough times have made us all the stronger to "press on toward the goal to win the prize of the higher calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:14) There were the challenges of gathering believers in a newly formed community. And then there was a matter of constructing a place in which the faithful would worship. There were pastors and elders and deacons needed to serve, teachers needed to educate, musicians needed to lead in praise. God called us together for the purpose of declaring good news of hope in the face of despair, a word of assurance in the midst of the uncertainties of daily struggle. But most important, we were entrusted with the unwavering truth that there is nothing in all creation that can separate us from God's loving care in Jesus Christ.

Ministers have come and gone. Buildings have been erected and razed. Fires and floods and disease have disrupted daily life. Political disagreements strained friendships. Denominational agenda has divided congregations. But through it all, the church has persevered, because while the church is in the world, it is not of this world. The church belongs to God alone, and its unity is defined by the love of Christ that we share. That unity is at the heart of what makes Blairsville who it is. With spiritual maturity we have grown beyond a mentality of competition to an understanding that regardless of our traditions, our purpose is the same. Those things that threaten to divide us are no where near as strong as the one who unites us. The witness of each congregation enhances the witness of all other congregations.

As we celebrate the first two hundred years of Presbyterianism in Blairsville, we rejoice in the ways God's kingdom has been glorified. But even more, we look forward in expectant hope to the ways the Holy Spirit will move through all Christians in this community making God's love visible. We've come a long way in our thinking. There was the time when we saw matters of faith in terms of "mine and thine." But as we move into the future of hope, we see faith as "ours." Heeding Paul's plea, we "rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep." One congregation's success is a reason for all people of faith to celebrate. And one Christian's sadness calls all believers to lament.

The seeds of faith sown in this soil two centuries ago have taken root, grown and bear fruit to this day. We are who we are because of the foundation that has been laid for us. At the same time, those who gather for the three hundredth anniversary will be who they are, in part because of who we, in faith, have been. We truly are living stones, and a question we are challenged to ask, a mandate we are charged to live out is: How does my witness today enhance the ministry of Christ's church in all the tomorrows to come? We thank God for all that has been yet we look forward to who we are becoming.....

"Like Living Stones"

I Peter 2:5 calls us to be "like living stones, built into a spiritual house...." That image of the church has been a watchword as we have moved closer to our 200th anniversary, and beyond. Many of you have been carrying stones in your pocket or purse as a reminder of Christ's presence with you and purpose for you. At the same time, our celebration calls us to consider who we are together.

We are asking each of you to bring a stone from your home to church on Sunday, September 18th. The stone should be about three inches in diameter. Once we have collected the stones, they will be arranged artistically. Jim Antis will use his creative gifts in making an "objet d'art" (French for art object) to be placed in the prayer garden. This is symbolic of our spiritual identity as a community of living stones. We don't know yet what it will look like—a mosaic or something three dimensional? Jim is quite artistic, so we'll see where the Spirit leads him. Texture, shape and color don't matter, but we do ask that the size be about three inches or less across. You can bring one from each person in your household or one to represent the whole family.

PASTOR'S LETTER.


DEAR FRIENDS:

Our second year of christian service has become history. It has been a year marked by the blessing of the Lord in the fruits of religious life and activity. God has been good to us in bestowing upon us both temporal and spiritual benefits and in placing the seal of success upon our united efforts to promote the interests of His kingdom. We have been blessed in the works of christian usefulness just in proportion to the extent of our willingness to obey His commands and to yield ourselves to the leadership of His Spirit. Attendance upon the means of grace and interest in the general work of the church have been gratifying. Some have removed from our bounds, a few have gone from the church militant to the church triumphant, and while we shall miss their familiar faces we should be grateful for the two-score souls General interest in who have joined our ranks and strengthened our forces. benevolence was perhaps never greater in the history of the church—this year totaling \$2341.65, an increase over last year of \$951.74. The total money contributed for all purposes for the year amounted to \$5883.50. Unusual interest has been manifested in the welfare of Blairsville College-55 members pledging almost \$5500.00 toward this worthy institution; should we include all members of the congregation who have pledged definite sums to this cause the amount would be almost \$7000.00. A Forward Movement campaign for Foreign Missions has been carried on with the result that the advance in missionary gifts as well as interest has been noteworthy. have our definite Parish Abroad-Teheran, Persia, the support of which station we share to the extent of \$500.00. Two Mission Study Classes, one for men and one for women, now meet weekly for the study of "Aliens or Americans?", while 50 subscriptions have been secured for the Assembly Herald. A Brotherhood was organized in December with a membership of 47, now 73, which is proving to be just what our church needs and has already resulted in new life and fellowship among the men. This organization is flourishing and is full of promise of blessing for the whole church. The prayer-meeting has been sustained with splendid interest, the men are beginning to be conspicuous by their presence. A Normal Class of 26 members for systematic Bible study meets each week after the Prayer-meeting, using Prof. Hurlbut's Revised Lessons as the text-book. The use of the new song books, Gospel Hymns Nos. 1-6, is putting new musical life in the Sunday School, Prayermeeting and Endeavor Societies. All the auxiliaries of the church have done

good, faithful work and your attention is called to their reports in the Year Book. You should not fail to read the Year Book from beginning to end. The Deacons have been able through the co-operation of contributors to meet all obligations promptly and the financial status of the congregation should call forth a note of thanksgiving. While the net gain in membership is small still the gain in development of the material within the church is large. The workers are increasing both in numbers and efficiency. There is almost no limit to the influence for good of 411 people if they be consecrated, united and persistent. The work is not all done; let us face the new ecclesiastical year with the conviction that "there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed." With profound gratitude to God for a successful year, let us press forward, seeking by Divine help and renewed vigor to enter in and possess the land for Christ. As your Pastor, I want to thank you heartily for your courtesy, sympathy and prayers. It is only by co-operation that we can hope to accomplish worthy results for the Master. It has been real joy to serve you and now as we enter upon our third year may it mean for us all deeper spirituality. broader sympathy and better service—to this end let us live and labor.




Pastor's letter and pastor from the 1907 Year Book of First Presbyterian Church



A.T. Bell Mrs. A. T. Bell presented the service flag


Dedication of the Service Flag bulletin World War I Date not printed, circa 1918

Food for Family Thought

- 1. If you could stand before the U.S. Congress and try to persuade them to pass a brand-new law, what new law would you want them to consider? What reasons would you give to support the need for this new law?
 - **The Kingdom of God happens not only in the future, but also in the present. Those who follow Jesus are called to do what we can, as we can; to establish justice; to reduce oppression; and to promote the common good. Talk with your child about current events that illustrate how people are bringing about positive change.
- 2. If you could travel back in time to live through any one year or event in American history, which year or event would you want to experience?
 - **Quickly make a spiritual timeline that lists the moments and events in your life that had the most impact on your spiritual beliefs. Review the highs and the lows, and list the top three most influential events. Reflect on what God was trying to tell you in these moments.
- 3. If you could safely witness any special effect being filmed for a movie, which one would you want to see above all others?
 - **Sometimes we expect God to appear in our lives like a special effect in a blockbuster movie. But it's more likely that we'll recognize God in the ripple rather than in the wave, or hear God in the silent aftermath rather than the raging storm—if only we take time to look and to listen.
