Last year at this time, we found ourselves having experienced a year like none other. Sadly today we find ourselves in the same place and have resigned ourselves to the new normal. The new normal is that we will probably never live our daily lives as we once did. Hospitals and care facilities shield their patients at the expense of isolating them from family and friends. Costs of basic goods keep rising with the blame being put on the supply chain. Educators are hampered by the added demands of teaching virtually. Social relations are strained by the constant concern about rising numbers and newly discovered viral strains.

But what about the church, that ancient institution that has ordered society for millennia? To be sure, there is nothing in all of creation that can crumble the rock on which the church is built, but over the past two years the day-to-day life of the church has been shaken. Nationwide there has been a notable decline in in-person attendance at worship. Many Sunday School programs have all but shuttered their doors. Pastoral care has been offered by phone and letter. Fellowship opportunities have been limited to socially distanced gatherings. Yet according to the Pew Research Center, one fourth of American adults say their faith has grown through the pandemic. It will be interesting to see how that growth is manifested, albeit in the institutional church or in the wellbeing of society at large.

I can honestly say that forty years ago Princeton Theological Seminary did not offer courses on how to move the church through times like this. Then again, pastors and church officers do not have the power to make all things right. It is by the grace of the Holy Spirit that we are moved through what is into what will be. While not all have returned to in-person worship, we realize that some never will. Changing health has limited the participation of some. Some have found convenience in watching online as it meets their schedule. Some have found meaning in different spiritual fellowships. And some have realized that the traditional church no longer meets their needs. The question before us is how can we effectively minister to those who welcome the Good News we offer? What needs have arisen that beckon a response on our part? How have we grown as individuals and a family of faith through the new ways our faith has been enhanced? As this 200 year old fellowship celebrates all that has been, who will we discover we have become?

Every now and then, someone will say, "I guess this pandemic has given you preachers some time to sit back and relax." Quite the opposite is the case. 46% of pastors under the age of 45 have seriously considered resigning and seeking other work. About the same percent of pastors of retirement age have taken an early out because of health and stress. Please be praying for your spiritual leaders, that they would sense the peace and power of the Spirit's presence.

I want to thank you for your faithful support during these uncertain times. You have seen that we have the resources needed to carry out the mission at hand, and your encouragement has been a blessing. Please also pray for understanding and vision as we address our new learnings discovered through the recent congregational survey.

May God continue to bless you and use you.....

Congratulations

Jonathan Clayton recently graduated from Penn State Behrend with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering with two areas of specialization. His senior project was a computer program to test how a bearing would perform in a computer design part. It gives the engineer all of the data needed to understand how it performs under varying conditions (i.e. temperature, speed, vibrations, etc.) It takes what was a month of testing to minutes. His program allows the engineer to find and use the best bearing before building and mechanically testing the part. The program design and testing took almost a year to do with 3 other students. The company he wrote the program for was SKF Bearings. After the program was finished and SKF looked at the potential for it, Jonathan was offered a summer internship to change a few things and get it ready for company wide distribution. This led to a job after graduation and a move. Jonathan is now living outside of Dearborne and working in Plymouth, Michigan as a project engineer. Part of his job is to use the program He wrote.
