The poet T. S. Eliot wrote, "For last year's words belong to last year's language, and next year's words await another voice. And to make an end is to make a beginning." Our month January, is named for the Roman god Janus who was seen as the diety of all beginnings, gates, transitions, doorways, passages and endings. He was depicted with two faces, each one gazing in the opposite direction of the other. As we enter a new year that is sort of where we are. We cannot ignore what has been because that has in part informed who we are. At the same time we realize that life involves a constant sense of becoming. One of our bulletin boards reads, "We look back thanking God, we look forward trusting God." Our words of yesterday were spoken out of our experience of yesterday while what is stirred in our hearts and passes through our lips today and tomorrow will be a whole new language, because we have been changed.

In I Corinthians 13, Paul writes, "When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known...." The process of spiritual growth moved Paul through the years. Each testimony of faith he heard encouraged him in his faith journey. Each miracle he witnessed broadened his sense of wonder in the power of God. Each burden he bore with a fellow believer the more sensitive he became to the Spirit's touch. His language changed because his understanding was deepened. That is why the Psalmist calls us to sing a new song to the Lord for he has done marvelous things.

As Paul comes to the dusk of life in this world, he writes another letter to the Corinthians in which he reflects, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation; everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new" (II Corinthians 5:17) Baptism in the early church was a dramatic celebration of change. As a believer approached the waters he/she removed their old clothing as a visible way of saying my old ways are no longer a part of who I am. Freed from what they once held onto, they entered the pool and were baptized. Upon exiting the waters they were immediately covered with a new white robe symbolic of their new way of life. Many times at a funeral you see a pall, a white cloth, draped over the casket to remind us of our loved one's baptism.

In Colossians 3, Paul counsels believers "to put to death (to take off) whatever in us that is earthly." He then offers a long list of those things that have no place in a Christian's life styles. Once we have been "stripped down" we are "dressed up." "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience...." (Colossians 3:12ff). There comes a point when we have to be brave enough to say goodbye to those things that no longer are consistent with what we want to become because it is only then we are free to say hello and fully claim who Christ is calling us to be. The second Sunday of the new year we celebrate Jesus' baptism and therein are reminded of our baptism, the sign and seal of God's covenant promise made to us, the assurance that in Christ nothing can separate us from God.

Overwhelmed in the joy of his redemption, a fellow prayed, "Lord, I thank you I'm not the man I once was and I praise you that I'm not yet the fullness of the man you're recreating me to be." What the new year brings to you will depend a great deal on what attitude you bring to the new year. We are called to be resolute-purposeful, determined, unwavering. Jesus puts it more plainly, "Let your 'yes' be 'yes' and your 'no' be 'no' anything beyond that comes from the evil one" (Matthew 5:37).

God's blessing on you as you venture into this new year. Press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward calling.....

2023 Per Capita Update

Per Capita, literally "per head", is the amount requested from each member to cover the administrative expenses of the General Assembly, Synod and Presbytery. For 2023, that amount is \$36.25 per member on the active roll. That breaks down to: General Assembly—\$9.85, Synod—\$2.40, and Presbytery—\$24.00. The Session has taken action to withhold all per capita to General Assembly with the exception of contributions given with specific designation to it. Per Capita sent to support Synod and Presbytery is NOT used to support the General Assembly. For this reason, the session sees that those funds are paid unless you request that your share not be. A letter explaining your options with regards to your per capita was included in your offering envelopes. If you have questions, please contact the church office or see Pastor Monroe. We want to honor your intentions for your gifts to the work of the church.

Coupon Update

The total for the coupons received in the five years we have participated is \$501,634.97! A big thank you to everyone that has helped in accomplishing this amount.

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Confirmation Class Unites

On Sunday, December 18, 2022, four young men united with the congregation after completing several weeks of confirmation classes. Below are their statements of faith of these young men.

1—"As Christians, we are called to do many things. We are called to keep God's commandments, live as Jesus did, not to sin, and keep a strong relationship with God. Even though we will never live a spotless, sinless life like Jesus, we can try to get as close as we can. In my walk of faith, I haven't been perfect, but there have been many influential people who have strengthened my relationship with God. One person who has been influential is my great, grandma Doak. When she was alive on earth, she kept God's commandments, was thoughtful, and even if she needed help, she helped others. Just being around her has inspired me to become a better Christian and a better person. Another person who has been influential is my great aunt Alice. She was always at church and is also very thoughtful. She helped anyone even if something was going on. She made me a better Christian as well. The final two people who have helped me through my walk of faith are my parents, Dana an Adam Doak. They were the ones who introduced me to Christ and decided to get me baptized. Without them, I may not even know Christ, so I thank them for that. I am excited to get confirmed, and proud to become a faithful member of the church. I will try to keep God's word and his commandments. Thank you."

2—"Throughout my life I have been raised as a Christian and brought to church. I have learned lots about Christianity, my family, and myself. There have been times where I'm frustrated and I seek guidance from my parents who are there for me, but I also know that my good judgement is led by the Holy Spirit, with Jesus as my moral compass. Who is Jesus? A question I have found myself thinking about many times. I believe Jesus is the son of God, the reason I am who I am, and the light in the darkness. Jesus has done so much for me, he has guided me through hard times, been by my side as I made decisions, and most importantly took our sins to the cross. I feel closest to God in the woods. There is something about nature maybe it's being without other people or distractions that gives me time to appreciate him. Since God and Jesus have done so much for me, I try to help others in different ways. Including praying for others,

informing people about Christianity and my church, or just doing simple things like being kind. For me, wearing my cross necklace also guides me to make better choices and assures me that he is watching over me. I'm grateful my parents have baptized me, and now I'm prepared to affirm my faith and join the church on my own."

3—"I believe that God is the almighty Father. I believe he created everything including heaven and earth. I believe Jesus is his son who was sent to earth as a sacrifice for our sins. I believe the Holy Spirit is the presence of God in our lives. I believe that scripture is God's holy word and teaching sent to us to live by. I believe that the church is not only a building, but a people and congregation of believers. The church is where God is most felt and prevalent to us. The church is also where we go to hear the message of faith and fellowship among other believers. We the church are God's workers. The church is called to spread the good word of God through missions, outreach, and prayer. I am called to follow the teaching of God and follow his scripture. I can also spread his word locally and abroad through many forms."

4—"Although I haven't been alive for very long, I have always been part of this church. Twelve years ago, my parents baptized me here and have brought me to church to be part of a Christian family. Being in church makes me feel closer to God. I believe he is the almighty and that he created everything. I've learned a lot about Christianity in Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, and confirmation classes. I believe that God's only son is the world's savior. I think that Jesus has promised us a place in heaven. Since we can't be sinless, he has taken humanities' sins upon himself and went to the cross. The stories about him in the New Testament have taught me how Jesus expects us to love God and one another. I say thank you to Jesus by treating others the way I want to be treated, by trying to forgive people, and by asking myself what would Jesus want me to do. I say thank you to God by praying and by the way I live my life. To me, being a part of this church means that I have a supportive family in faith. It also means that I need to help that family with the talents God has given me. Since my baptism, people have been guiding me to be a person of faith. My mom, Pastor Tim, and my Grammy have helped me see what God has given us and how I should live. My mom always talks to me and my brothers about how we should love God and Jesus. She tells us to listen to the Holy Spirit that helps us choose right over wrong. I feel God is with me all the time because he's everywhere, but I feel him closest when I'm praying. Next Sunday on my 13th birthday, I would like to join this church because I believe Jesus and God are our creators and will guide me throughout my entire life."

A Lenten Activity

Pretzels were first baked during Lent because they can be made with only water, flour, and salt. The shape came from a posture of prayer, with arms crossed and hands on opposite shoulders. A monk made dough into this criss-crossed shape, and the pretzel was born!

Lenten Pretzel Recipe Ingredients:

- 1 package yeast (.25 oz)
- 1 1/2 cups warm water
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups flour
- 1 egg
- extra salt for the tops- large salt works best!

Mix your yeast, water, sugar, and salt in a large bowl. Stir in the flour, and knead until the dough is smooth. Shape into the form of arms crossed in prayer and place it on a baking sheet. Brush the dough with a beaten egg to give it a shiny finish. Sprinkle the top with salt, and bake in an oven preheated to 425 degrees for 15 minutes.
