Through my forty-one plus years of preaching and teaching there have been hundreds of topics that have come up to which folks have commented, "I didn't know that was in the Bible." Conversely there are just as many topics on which the Bible is silent. God is not mentioned in two books of the Old Testament, Esther and Song of Solomon. The Lord's presence is inferred but not mentioned by name. The topic of patriotism is not mentioned. That is because our loyalty to God far exceeds our loyalty to any particular earthly nation. The focus of our citizenship is on God's kingdom no matter where we live geographically. Now in Romans 13, Paul is clear that we respect earthly authority. We follow the rules of the nation in which we live, unless those rules violate and dishonor who God calls us to be. We are Christians first and citizens of an earthly land second. The Bible doesn't waste words on earthly seconds, because in the end they will not stand.

Another word the Bible does not speak of is one that has consumed me lately—retirement. It is mentioned in passing in an obscure passage in Number 8:25-26. The Lord speaks to Moses about the Levites, the priests. "From 25 years of age and upward they shall begin to do duty in the service of the tent of meeting and from the age of 50 they shall retire from the duty of service and serve no more." Someone said, "Old preachers never die, they just go on and on and on" - but enough about our orations from the pulpit. Moses didn't begin leadership until he was 80 and continues until he died at 120. His protégé, Joshua started at 85 and went until he was 100. Scholars have no definitive understanding as to why the Lord chose 50 years of age as the limit for full priestly service. Maybe it had to do with physical stamina. The priests had to move the structural pieces of the tabernacle across the desert and they weren't light. Large animals were offered up in the ritual sacrifices, and they could sometimes be stubborn. Maybe by age 50, the priests were burned out by 25 years of round the clock service. Maybe at that age they were no longer relevant to the people's needs. Maybe they had to step aside, passing the baton of spiritual leadership to the next generation. Now priests over 50 could still assist, but they couldn't be in charge.

They say the most difficult instrument to play is second fiddle. When you've spent most of your life on center stage, it's painful being moved to stage right or left. When your grip is loosened from the reins you once held so tight, it's natural to try to grab hold of other things. Maybe that, because we allow our work to define us, and when we feel that work is no longer ours to do, we lose our sense of identity. Change is difficult, whether we're in a crib or a playpen or a classroom or a workplace or a care facility. But our life circumstance does not define who we are because it does not change whose we are.

In a few weeks, I'll come through the kitchen door and say, "Bobbi, I'm home—forever." And under her breath she'll mutter "Great, now I got twice as much husband but half as much privacy." Partially true, but I'll still have 24 hours in a day and 7 days in a week. My challenge will be what do I do with them. For the past four decades my life has been dictated by everyone else's schedules and needs and convenience. And now I get to sit in the driver's seat. But with that freedom comes responsibility in how I use my time. Leaving my position here I had to surrender my email account. I'm no longer pastor@r-church.com. So I opened a new account that defines my rebirth, redeemedforgood@gmail.com. And so the discovery of this new stage of my life begins. They say when you have nothing to do, something inside dies. Every life event brings opportunity for the new, but so too it brings some grief for what you've left behind. We never stop growing up. We're always graduating to the next adventure. While you can't teach an old dog new tricks, you can put new tires on an old car—that's why they call it retirement.

My tank is filled, my wheels are aligned, its been a good ride, but I have miles to go before I sleep. There are friendships to savor, memories to relive, new things to learn—new parts of myself to share with those who welcome me into their lives. And just as I am at the threshold of newness, so too there is a wonderful freshness headed to the threshold of this family of faith. May the fullness of God's goodness bless each of us as we move forward.
